Working Together for a Cleaner Nahant

The Rodent Control Program is only effective if everyone takes responsibility for keeping their homes and businesses as rodent proof as possible. Remember, if rats cannot feed, they cannot breed!

Prevention

- Store garbage in plastic or metal containers with tight lids so rats can't get in
- Place trash outside shortly before pick-up- don't leave plastic garbage bags outside.
- Do not leave pet or bird food out.
 Remove uneaten pet food when pet is done feeding. Bird feeders should not continue to be used if you observe rodent activity in your area.
- Don't give rodents a place to stay! Abandoned buildings, vehicles, and appliances should be properly secured. Keep lawns and properties maintained: Lawns should be cut short enough to prevent rats from nesting and hiding.

Education

 Removing food sources, water, and items that provide shelter for ro-

Management

 The CDC recommends an integrated approach with an emphasis on environmental sanitation, proper food storage, rodent-proofing, and trapping. The use of rodenticides should only be used in areas of large infestations and only in places that minimize contact with non-target species (domestic animals, other wildlife species) and small children (CDC, 2017). Remember that poison baits can be dangerous for people and animals and must be used according to label instructions and are best left to state licensed pest control operators. Prevention is key!
